



Glog, short for graphical blog, is the name used to describe a publicly accessible graphical blog. A person or organization’s glog is actually an interactive multimedia image that looks similar to a poster, but readers of a glog are able to interact with the content.

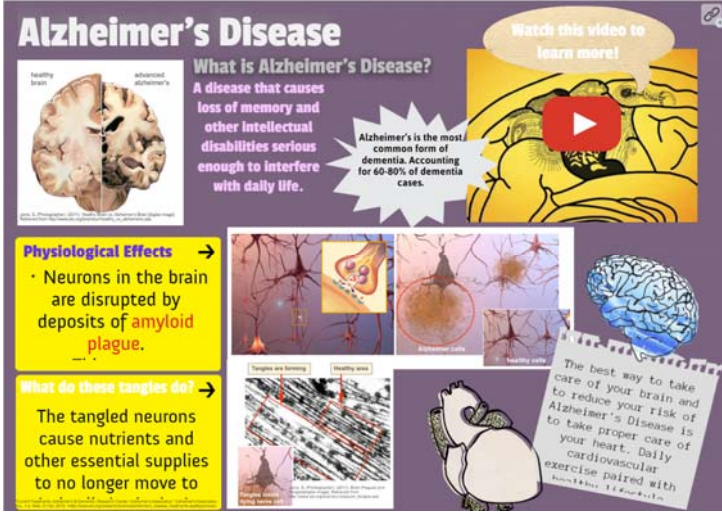
Glogster is a cloud-based platform for presentation and interactive learning. It allows users to mix all kinds of media on a virtual canvas to create multimedia posters, and access a library of engaging educational content created by students and educators worldwide.

Glogster’s tool allows user to create these virtual posters combining text, audio, video, images, and hyperlinks and to share them with others electronically.

Glogster uses a very easy to understand, drag and drop interface.
